## Remember This Week



- 4. What song describes your 2019?
- 5. Who is an older person, other than parents or grandparents, who has had a significant impact on your life in some way? What was the impact?

What's been on your Playlist for 2019? What new tunes have you discovered? What old favourites have you fallen back in love with? What was the song that you replayed most? How does your playlist mirror the events, the emotions, the journey of the past year or anticipate the approaching new year? Today Simeon shares the song whose tune is timeless, and whose lyrics give meaning to every generation, regardless of culture, nationality, preference or personality. 


## Read Luke 2:22-38

- 6. What words, themes, or ideas stand out for you most in this text?
- 7. What things strike you about Simeon? Who was he, what are we told about him?
- 9 What was Simeon waiting for? What do you think "the consolation of Israel" means?











- 10. What is the longest you've ever waited to receive something you've been promised, and what was it? How did you feel when the promise was finally fulfilled?
- 11. What do we learn about mission from this text? It's scope, it's reach, it's purpose
- 12. What do you learn about God from this reading?
- 13. How do Simeon and Anna represent hopeful living?

Mary and Joseph had waited nine months for their promised child to be born, but the people of Israel had been anticipating the coming of the promised Messiah for centuries. Simeon was one such man. Simeon was "righteous"; that is, he kept God's laws and the laws of his society, behaving well toward others. He also was "devout," carefully fulfilling prescribed religious duties. The combination of the words "righteous" and "devout" stresses that he thoughtfully lived out his relationship with God. In addition, we are told that he was full of the Holy Spirit.

- 14. What is the relationship between Simeon's righteousness and active devotion nd his recognition of the Saviour and what can you learn from that in your own life?
- 15. When you come to Church to worship, do you come with the anticipation that God will reveal himself to you? Why or why not?

The coming of Jesus is not just a sentimental, feel-good story. Immediately after praising God for Jesus' birth, Simeon told Mary news that no parent ever wants to hear, that their child would be divisive, causing the fall and rise of many. People would not remain neutral to Jesus. Division would result from his life and ministry as some would fall in judgment while others would rise in salvation. Even some of Jesus' own people would reject him. This is made clear at the start of the gospel story, not part of a surprise ending. Jesus would cause division and opposition even as He went about bringing reconciliation, redemption, and salvation.

16. How does Jesus cause the rising and falling of people today and why do you think some people are really threatened by Jesus?



Only when Simeon held and recginised the baby Jesus in his arms for who he is, was he ready to depart in peace. Only Jesus matters. That's what Simeon tells us today. All his longings were met in the one he received that day.

16. What is your greatest longing, and what does that reveal about where your heart is focussed and what your ears are attuned to?

Jesus comes to reveal the Father's glory. We are also told in this passage that he is the revealer of hearts?

- 17. What has he revealed in your heart over the last month? If you struggle to find something, why do you think that is?
- 18. What aspects of your Christian life require you to wait patiently and how does cradling Jesus make all the difference in your waiting?
- 19. What is one spiritual goal you have for 2020, and how can your LifeGroup help you achieve that goal. Be bold in choosing something.



- \* Praise God for the gift of salvation which enables you to live for eternity. Thank Jesus for coming in the flesh to be the fulfilment of all God's promises. Ask the Holy Spirit to help you sing the song of Simeon daily in your life, living in peace and with a purpose in 2020.
- \* Pray for those families devastated by the fires in our country at the present time, for those who have lost loved ones or property and for those who fight the fires that God would strengthen them in their weariness and protect them in difficult situations.
- \* Pray for LifeWay in 2020, that God would continue to use us in greater ways to fulfill his purpose and plan for us.
- \* Pray for a boldness to live more fully in his grace, confident of your salvation and active in doing what God has called you to do, knowing that it is never a waste of time.
