1 Peter 2:9 (Full Text – 1 Peter 2:4-10)



**REMEMBER** this week

Our purpose is to live the reality of who God says we are.

ask you difficult questions, although that may sometimes be a bonus side effect. What we really hope is that as we wrestle with the actual questions people are asking, it might also address some of the unasked questions and secret doubts that many Christians have themselves but are often too afraid to ask.

So this week we ask, 'does life have a purpose?' It seems that today there are two main philosophies outside of Christianity, that want to provide an answer to that question. On the one hand there is the secular scientific theory proposed by the famous atheist and biologist, Richard Dawkins in his book 'The Selfish Gene', who suggests that the only purpose in life is the passing on of our genetic code to the next generation. The alternative is the increasingly popular humanist philosophy that tells us that the meaning or purpose of life is to discover your 'authentic self' and to be the 'real' you. In both cases purpose is wrapped up in our identity. If, as Richard Dawkins suggests, we are in fact just a random collection of genetic material trying to ensure its survival by duplicating itself into the next generation then his argument makes sense. If it is true that our identity is something that we can discover and define for ourselves then we have problems when other people try to define or identify themselves, or us, in ways that conflict with our own definitions.

It is true that our purpose is deeply connected to our identity, but it has to be the right identity. Where better to go for an accurate definition of our identity and purpose than to the one who crated us. So, let's read **Ecclesiastes 12:13-14 and 1 Peter 2:4-10** HERE or in your own Bible.

- 4. Try to summarise the main idea of these passages.
- 5. What verse/concept/teaching in these readings caught your attention and what was challenging/confronting/comforting about them for you?
- 6. 'The Teacher' who writes the book of Ecclesiastes has spent the rest of the book trying to find purpose in all sorts of things, wisdom and knowledge, hard work, fame and wealth, frivolity and excessive living, you name it, and he's tried it. These verses are his conclusion after all his searching. Why do you think he lists "fear God" and "keep his commands" as life's purpose?
- 7. In 1 Peter 2:9-10, Peter describes God's people with several titles. What do these titles (chosen people, royal priesthood, holy nation, God's special possession) tell us about God's purpose for his people?



Both Ecclesiastes and 1 Peter 2:4-10 point us to the same truth: life's ultimate purpose is not found in ourselves but in God – revering Him, living by His Word and proclaiming his greatness. Think about standing in front of an abstract sculpture in a gallery. You might admire it, question it, or even be puzzled by it. You can guess at its meaning and intended purpose, but the only one who truly knows its purpose is the sculptor who created and shaped it. In the same way, we can search for meaning in many places – and sometimes we may even discover part of the truth – but only our Creator can reveal the true and full purpose he has in mind for his creation and his creatures.

- 8. If many people today look for purpose in success, relationships, or personal fulfilment, how do the Bible's answers in Ecclesiastes and 1 Peter offer a different perspective?
- 9. Peter describes believers as being built together into a spiritual house. What difference might it make in our world if people understood their purpose as something shared in community, rather than pursued individually?
- 10. Both passages highlight that our purpose is received from God rather than invented by ourselves. How might that truth bring clarity or freedom in the midst of the confusion people often feel about meaning and identity today?



#### **MAKE IT REAL:**

We've considered how God, as our Creator, is the one who defines our true purpose, and how Scripture gives us a clearer vision of that purpose in Christ. Just as an abstract sculpture can puzzle us unless we ask the artist, and clay cannot tell the potter how to shape it, we can trust that God knows exactly how to shape our lives for his glory and our good. The next step is to bring this truth closer to home—what it means for the way we live, the choices we make, and the hope we carry in our daily lives.

- 11. If our purpose it to glorify God and proclaim his greatness, what might that look like in the ordinary rhythms of your week (work, home, relationships)?
- 12. Peter describes believers as a "chosen people" and a "royal priesthood". How might embracing that identity shape the way you approach the opportunities and challenges you face?
- 13. When life feels confusing or lacking direction, how could remembering that our Creator defines our purpose help to steady and guide you in those times?
